Hi Folks

 - Play through the Travis Picking exercises
 - Pick a slow song The Fields of Athenry and
 - Bridge Over Troubled Water

Twelve Bar Blues

What is the 12-Bar Blues?

The 12-bar blues is the most commonly occurring chord progression in the blues and rock and roll. It has been used by blues musicians since the beginning of the 20th century and features in some of the most famous blues and rock songs of all time, including Blue Suede Shoes, Deep Ellem Blues, Johnny B Goode, Kansas City and countless others.

In technical terms, the 12-bar blues is a chord progression that lasts for 12 bars, or measures then repeats itself throughout the course of the song. The chord progression is typically made up of 3 different chords, specifically, being based around the first, fourth and fifth chords of any given key.

12 bar blues in C

Let's take the key of C. It is made up of a scale of eight notes -

CDEFGABC

I IV and V are Roman numerals for 1, 4 and 5 so let's take the first (root), fourth and fifth notes i.e. I = C, IV = F, V = G. We now have our chords C, F and G

The 12 bar blues has a formula for how the chords are played -

Four bars of C

Two bars of F and Two bars of C

Two bars of G and Two bars of C.... then back to the beginning

12 bar blues in other keys

To generalise the pattern to any key we would write it –

Note: You will guite often find that the V chord is played as a seventh e.g., C7, A7 etc.

Have a go at Kansas City – Book 2 page 100. You will find in this song and most others there are some variations e.g. bridges with single splangs or adding minor chords but at the end of the day you will see that they follow the standard 12-bar pattern.

Playing a Rock riff

Start by simply strumming through the pattern in C then work out the structure in other keys.

A rock riff in the key of C

As you have seen from the chart above you play a 12-bar in C using the chords C, F and G (or G7 for a bit of variety)


Let's have a go at playing Johnny B Goode. Fist have a listen to Chuck Berry playing it. This video is in the key of C so after a bit of practice you will be playing along with him. - https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=6ROwVrF0Ceg

Exercise 1

Now using the music in Songbook Two page 99 – just strum through the song until you get the swing of it. If you are really confident strum along with the video.

Now for the Rock riff

(This is purely a personal thing but I always use C5 when playing this riff – choose whether to use a straight C or the C5)



Exercise 2
Now play Johnny B Goode again using positions 1 and 2

Exercise 3

Now simply try this all again using positions 1 to 4. You will notice it drives you to a different rhythm. The 1 to 4 is not better than the 1 & 2 just different. You now have three ways of playing your 12-bars – straight chords, 1&2 and 1 to 4.

A rock riff in the key of A


Exercise 4

When you have worked out how to play in A from the chart on page 1 (or have cheated and gone back to the songbook) try playing along to 'Kansas City' – the YouTube at the beginning of this article. You strum pattern is UDUD

Now we are going to make things a bit more interesting by making the chords more dynamic as we did with Johnny B Goode – instead of just playing one chord you will play two or three variations.

Exercise 5

Let's stick with 'Kansas City' – Songbook Two page 100. The song is made of the chords A, D and E. You will see sevenths included – these are for effect and for the moment you can forget the sevenths and just play major chords. Just use positions 1 and 2 for the moment.



Exercise 6

Now simply try this all again using positions 1 to 4. You will notice it drives you to a different rhythm. The 1 to 4 is not better than the 1 & 2 just different. You now have three ways of playing your 12-bars — straight chords, 1&2 and 1 to 4.

Finding Rock riffs for other keys

Using the information in this article you have everything you need to play in the keys of D and G – so have a go. You can explore the internet or work things out for yourself to try other keys. Perhaps we can share these other keys at a later date.

Turnarounds

Turnarounds are riffs which usually take you from the end of a verse to another verse or chorus. We have already looked at turnarounds in A and G and these have been added in below.

Count: 1 & 2 & 3 & 4 & (outer strings, then inner strings)
