The target will be to finger pick Leonard Cohen's Chelsea Hotel all the way through by Easter.

Verse 1: [A] Bonnie and Clyde were [D] pretty lookin' [E7] people

This tune was written by Jamie Allen, a celebrated Northumbrian piper and friend of the aristocracy, but also a thief, bigamist, and deserter. He was born in about 1734 at Swindon near Rothbury, in Northumberland. and died in a Durham prison cell the day before his pardon was received from the Prince Regent. There was a time some 200 years ago when Jamie was as famous throughout Britain as Robin Hood is today.

He was well known for enlisting in the army, taking the Kings bounty then deserting. He was finally caught out and faced the firing squad which he escaped through playing his pipes so beautifully. Many adventures are ascribed to Jamie Allan although few can be verified but, like Robin Hood, he is always regarded as a romantic figure, despite his obvious faults.
